Pemberton Township High School

Pemberton Township High School is a comprehensive grade 9-12 high school located in northern Burlington County. Students can take advantage of a wide variety of AP and Honors courses, over 30 College Acceleration Program (CAP) courses, and technical and school-to-work programs.

SPECIALIZED LEARNING ACADEMIES

Specialized learning academies provide motivated students with a comprehensive education in a focused area of interest. Academies increase relevance and rigor of the curriculum by focusing on career interests of students. PTHS offers the Aeronautics, Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (A-STEM) Academy, the Medical Arts Academy and the Fine Arts and Music Experience Academy (FAME).

Classes follow a block schedule, allowing students to take more courses (8 each year) than a traditional schedule.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT COURSES

Students who demonstrate superior performance may be recommended for Advanced Placement courses. Currently, PTHS offers AP courses in Biology, Calculus, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Language & Composition, Literature & Composition, Music Theory, Physics, Physic C: Mechanics, Psychology, Statistics, Studio Art 2-D, Studio Art 3-D, Studio Art Drawing, US History, European History and World History. Students who take the Advanced Placement examination are eligible for college credit from cooperating higher learning institutions.

ART

A full range of art courses are available and include Fine Art I, II, III and IV, as well as a variety of both year and semester courses such as Arts & Crafts, Jewelry Making and Experiencing Art.

Students are encouraged to participate in the New Jersey Teen Arts Festival and other competitions.

BUSINESS

Business courses focus on the development of marketable office skills to prepare for the workforce, as well as keyboarding and speedwriting skills for academic and personal use. A wide range of course offerings includes Desktop Publishing, Accounting, Finance, Web Page Design, and Business Law. Advanced Placement to Cooperative Business Education and work-study situations often follows mastery of basic skills areas.

ENGLISH

The English curriculum provides for mastery of communication skills at all levels of competency, ranging from English as a Second Language for the non-English speaking student, up to Enrichment English programs all four years of high school. Reading, writing, and listening skills are emphasized at all levels. Junior and senior electives such as Humanities, Speech, and Creative Writing reinforce the above skills and provide expanded opportunities for the study of literature and communication. Four courses are required for graduation.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

Students have the opportunity to study French, German and Spanish for four years. Each course offers grammar, literature, and conversation as an integral part of the language and culture. One course is required for graduation.

MATHEMATICS

The Mathematics Department offers math instruction from a basic skill level up through advanced work in Calculus. College Preparatory courses are Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, Advanced Algebra/Trigonometry, and Pre-calculus. Electives include Algebra III, Calculus, and AP Calculus. Enrichment sections are offered at each level of the college prep courses. A wide range of computer courses are also available. Courses begin with Computer Applications, Computer Animation, and proceed with Visual BASIC and JAVA. Four courses of mathematics are required for graduation.

SOCIAL STUDIES

Students must take two courses of United States History and one course of World History as a state graduation requirement. A variety of electives are also offered and include Sociology and Law in American Society. Honors sections are also offered in World History, US History I and II.

MUSIC

The music curriculum is centered around the performing medium with offerings in Concert Choir, Choraliers and Band. A double period, 10 credit Band option is offered through four years of high school. Accomplished vocalists and instrumentalists provide the school and community with entertaining programs throughout the school year. One course of Art/Music is required for graduation.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND HEALTH

NINTH GRADE - 311

Physical Education classes are required for all students. Physical fitness classes provide instruction in team sports such as flag football, soccer, volleyball, floor hockey, and softball, as well as conditioning. Emphasis is also placed on lifetime sports, such as tennis, golf, bocce ball and croquet. Health classes focus upon drug and alcohol prevention, driver education, family-life education, interpersonal family relationship etc.

SCIENCE

Applicable Science courses include Comprehensive Science and Integrated Science. College Preparatory Lab Sciences offered are: Physical Science, Biology, Environmental Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. Enrichment sections are offered in Physical Science, Biology, Physics, and Chemistry for those students who express a strong Science aptitude. Four courses of science are required for graduation.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION / INDUSTRIAL ARTS / HOME ECONOMICS

The Vocational Education/Industrial Arts/Family & Consumer Life programs offer a wide variety of courses such as Graphic Arts, Bakery, Health Occupations, Horticulture, Auto Mechanics, Woodshop and Culinary Arts. Work experience is also available via Cooperative Business Education, Cooperative Industrial Education and Cooperative Marketing Education. One course is required for graduation.

IROTO

The high school JROTC is an exemplary unit, as noted by its designation as an Honor Unit with Distinction. Awarded by the United States Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps, this award is the highest unit level rating possible in Army JROTC. The Pemberton Township High School JROTC is active in community service, school support, and has an award winning Drill Team. Color Guard. and Air Rifle Team.

COLLEGE ACCELERATION PROGRAM (CAP)

PTHS students can get a "jump start" on their college careers by enrolling in over 30 CAP courses. Through an agreement with the local community college, students can obtain both high school credit and college credit for select courses in a variety of subjects.

PROFESSIONAL STAFF

The professional staff includes 110 teachers, two school nurses, one librarian, two psychologists, two social workers, two learning disabilities specialists, two speech correction language specialists, six counselors, and one student assistance coordinator.


COMMUNITY PROFILE
