- We are a 100% military-connected school housing six Pre-K rooms (ages 3 & 4 years) and two sections of each grade from K - 5th grade.
- Our students come from all branches of the military, as we are housed on the military installation Joint Base McGuire Dix Lakehurst.
- Our school is exceptionally multicultural with many of our students being first-generation Americans and many more have been born on military bases throughout the world.

- Fort Dix Elementary has twice been named a National School of Character and a New Jersey State School of Character. Our methodologies have twice been awarded as “promising practices” by the National Schools of Character. Last year, US News and World Reports recognized us as one of the Best Elementary Schools for 2024.
- We have been an Anchored4Life school for the past three years.

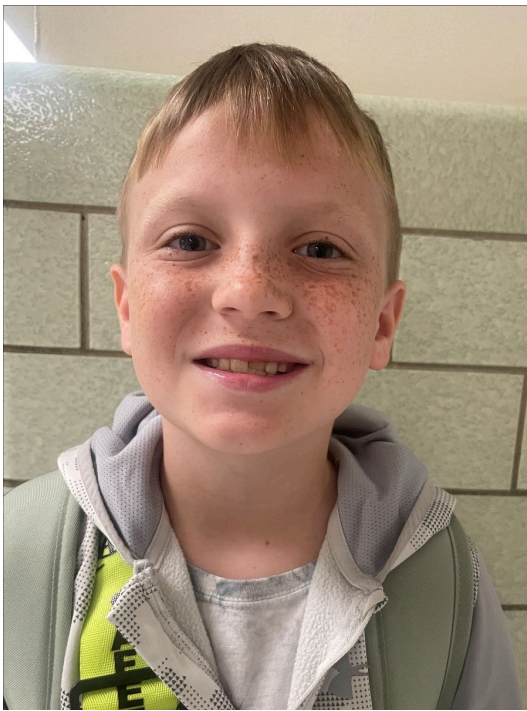
April Donovan - Adviser

Activity Groups



Pre-K Life Skills Lessons

Our Team Leaders love doing Activity Groups, especially when they can visit

their younger siblings. We have six classes of Pre-K (3 and 4-year-olds) at our school. Team Leaders prepared a lesson with their school Counselor Mrs. Quinlan, an A4L Adviser, that taught our youngest students how to calm down using breathing exercises. The Pre-K students learned “cocoa breathing” which is breathing in deeply to smell the pretend hot cocoa and breathing out to cool it down. In the picture below, our Team Leaders are teaching “roller coaster breathing” which is tracing your fingers while you breathe in (up) and out (down). When students make it all the way to the pinkie, they’ve done 5 deep breaths.



Wellness Week - March

During our Wellness Week, Team leaders teach Pre-K classes calming techniques. They especially love it when they can teach their own siblings!



Also during our Wellness Week, Team Leaders taught a health lesson to the K-2 classes. The students loved learning about their heart and blood cells from their peers!



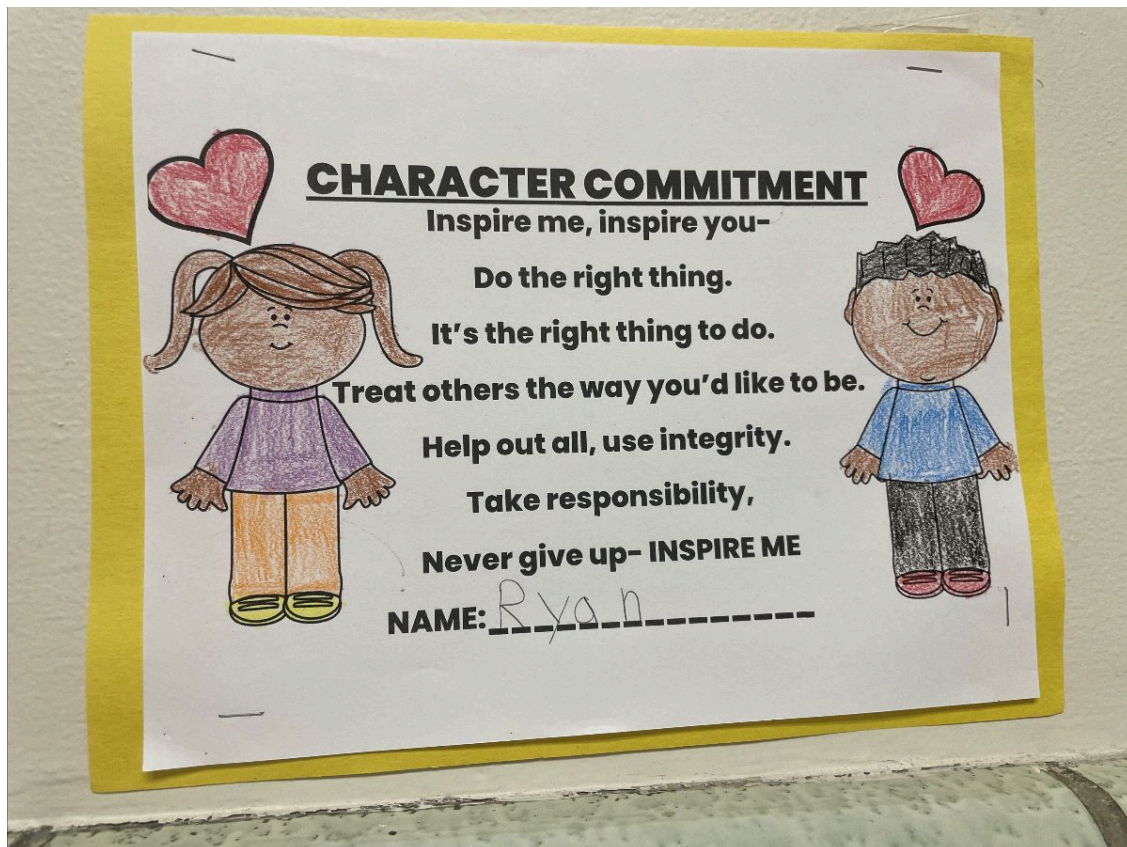

Final Words from our Principal

During my tenure as principal at Fort Dix Elementary School, the Anchored4Life program became an essential component in addressing the unique challenges faced by our military-connected students. Given the frequent relocations, separations, and transitions of military family life, many of our students arrived feeling isolated, uprooted, and in need of immediate support. Anchored4Life provided a structured, peer-led framework that met these needs directly, creating a warm, welcoming environment where new students could quickly feel at home.

Team Leaders were trained to extend empathy and guidance to newcomers, helping them navigate both the academic and social aspects of school life. This focus on easing transitions not only addressed the emotional and social challenges military children often face but also fostered a resilient, connected school culture where students could adapt and thrive. Anchored4Life thus became more than just a program; it was a lifeline that bridged gaps, offering stability and continuity in an otherwise transient lifestyle.
