PTHS MEDICAL ARTS ACADEMY INTRODUCES NEW PATIENT SIMULATOR

The Pemberton Township High School Medical Arts Academy has received a patient simulator to provide students with an enormous learning advantage.

A Carl D. Perkins Foundation grant helped provide the simulator. PTHS received \$92,762, the second highest amount awarded in Burlington County, which allowed it to purchase the \$44,000 simulator.

The Gaumard Susie S2000 is an advanced, wireless simulator that serves as a learning resource for students in the Medical Arts Academy. The capabilities of the simulator allow students to experience the delivery of effective and realistic simulation learning experiences.

PTHS is one of only two schools in

New Jersey to have the Susie S2000 patient simulator.

McCartney said. "The simulator is equipped with various features

that enhance hands-on learning for students. This opportunity will tremendously benefit our students looking to pursue a career in the medical field."

The full-body adult patient simulator is powered by an internal rechargeable battery that lasts up to four hours. Susie can also be converted to a male and/ or geriatric patient to help students learn how to navigate different human anatomy scenarios in the event of a medical emergency.

The tether-less simulator is completely responsive during transport and also features "realistic joint articulation."

Its neurological features include active blinking eyes, mild or severe seizures

and preprogrammed speech responses in different languages.

The simulator also provides an in-depth cardiac and circulation evaluation experience. Students can monitor normal and abnormal

heart rates, sounds and intensities. The monitoring procedures utilize real devices and sensors that allow chest compressions to be logged. Its advanced technological features also allow students to learn how to use a defibrillator through live energy.

The Susie S2000 also has bilateral IV training arms, an internal pulse that allows for measurable blood pressure examinations, and gynecology examination features.

"The simulator has made learning more interactive," senior Montana Fulmer said. "It's helped us learn different medical procedures at a quicker rate."

DENBO-CRICHTON HOSTS HOT-AIR BALLOON ASSEMBLY

Denbo-Crichton recognized its theme "Student Success Rising Up" with a hot-air balloon assembly on November 4.

Joe Pluck from Stellar Hot Air Ballooning pulled onto the playground field of Denbo-Crichton. He brought a female co-pilot and three other family members to help. Pluck laid the balloon out on the field and inflated it for the K-2 and fourth grade classes. He instructed the students on the basics of hot air ballooning, before allowing students to ask questions. The second assembly for grades 3 and 5 were able to see principal Brett Thorp rise approximately 30 feet in the air and come down in the balloon!

Students prepared for the presentation through a discussion that

explained the three main sections of the balloon, the basket's

purpose for transporting passengers through its sturdiness, the components of the fuel burner system and the enveloped fabric portion of the balloon that augments its eye-catching

appearance.

Teachers also discussed the laws and requirements for becoming a balloon pilot, along with the hot-air balloon's categorization as a Lighter than Air (LTA) aircraft.

"This was an incredible experience for our students," Thorp said. "Mr. Pluck's presentation offered our students the opportunity to incorporate our theme of rising up to

success through an exciting lesson about hot-air balloons that grabbed everyone's attention."
