PEMBERTON TOWNSHIP SCHOOLS CELEBRATES MONTH OF THE MILITARY CHILD

Pemberton Township Schools honored military students with a variety of activities and events throughout the month of April. The United States Department of Defense celebrates

The celebrations kicked off with a military family breakfast at Howard L. Emmons Elementary School on April 4th. Parents were invited to attend a fully-catered breakfast with their children, provided by the district's food services department. Students received honorary certificates and a video was shown of students telling their parents about their favorite part of being a military child.

Helen Fort Students Participate in March Mammal Madness Bracket Project

Seventh grade science students at Helen A. Fort Middle School participated in a March Mammal Madness project that spanned the months of March and April.

The yearly project is operated by Arizona State University and is designed to coincide with the annual NCAA men's basketball tournament, providing students with an interactive method of learning in biology studies.

The students were assigned one out of 65 animals to research in a group slide project. Then they had to use that as a resource to fill out their individual brackets which were based on NCAA

basketball. Videos were released three times a week by Arizona State showing the combatants battles and the winners. Students were awarded certificates for research, artwork, participation, engagement and top score. Trophies were also awarded to the top three scorers in each of the three science teachers' classes.

Through the exercises of the project, students were able to learn about different mammals and how they differ in terms of size, diet, habitat and behavioral traits.

Seventh grade students Lilith Longstreet, Iremsu Kangal, Brienna Thomas, Brielle Moran, Kenzlee Shinn and Aiden Mendiola were among the students that were recognized with certificates for their successful research.

"This project is great for our students as it allows them to learn about different species in a fun, interactive way," science teacher Merri Hirsh said. "The students

enjoyed working together in groups in a fun, yet competitive environment. Participants were able to learn about the research process through their studies. Projects like this will help prepare students for the future."

BUSANSKY POLLINATOR GARDEN DESIGN CONTEST

Pre-G.A.T.E. and G.A.T.E. Teacher for grades 1 through 5, Rebecca Gudknecht, created a school-wide contest at Busansky for all students on campus to participate in. Students were asked to create a layout for the school's courtyard, including a pollinator garden and outside classroom. The winning design with the most votes would be used by the Pinelands Preservation Alliance to build the courtyard garden. The series of projects implemented at Busansky increased environmental awareness among students, and the implementation of a green infrastructure taught students about the importance of environmental stewardship.
