# TONY TRONGONE NAMED SUPERINTENDENT OF PEMBERTON SCHOOLS

Tony Trongone of Barrington, NJ has been named superintendent of Pemberton Township Schools. Trongone previously served as superintendent of schools for Berlin Borough and Gibbsboro Public Schools, a post he held for the past five years. He assumed his new post July 1st, replacing superintendent Michael R. Gorman, Ed.D., who moved on to become the new president of Salem County College in Salem, NJ.

“After an extensive search, we are confident we have found an outstanding superintendent to lead Pemberton Township Schools,” said board of education president Christopher Otis.

“With Tony’s background, values, and leadership qualities, we believe he has the experience and drive to guide the Pemberton learning community well into the future.”

Trongone earned his master’s degree in Educational Administration from Wilmington University and his BA in Mathematics from Rutgers University. His previous experience includes serving as district supervisor of curriculum and instruction for Cherry Hill Public Schools, supervisor of mathematics for Gloucester City School District, and secondary mathematics teacher at Northern Burlington Regional High School in Columbus, NJ.

“It is my belief that all students can learn and it is our

responsibility as educators to support students in reaching their fullest potential,” said Trongone. “As an educational leader, I prescribe to the theory of ‘high challenge with high support.’ As superintendent of Pemberton Township Schools, I will strive to provide our students with a rigorous instructional program and multiple pathways to college and career readiness. We will also continue to put in place the supports necessary to ensure the success of each and every Pemberton student.”

Trongone’s experience includes implementing ACHIEVE NJ and Danielson Framework for Teaching in his previous district, as well as executing the PARCC

testing protocols. He is a pioneer in implementing SMARTboard technology, and established Character Education Programs in both Berlin Borough and Gibbsboro Schools districts, resulting in both schools being named National Schools of Character.

He is currently a Trustee for the New Jersey School Board Insurance Group and has served as president-elect of the Association of Mathematics Teachers of New Jersey. His other professional memberships include the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, the National Staff Development Council and the New Jersey Principals and Supervisors Association, among others.



# BOOKS, BOOKS AND MORE BOOKS!

Students throughout Pemberton will be able to enjoy reading their very own books this summer, thanks to two free book distribution programs. Once again, Kathy Spence, Reading Specialist, headed up the summer book program at Harker-Wylie and Stackhouse schools, and with a team of dedicated volunteers, gave away over 6400 books. Elementary students were able to select 18 books each to take home and enjoy all summer long.

"It is so important to get books into the hands of children. What we do now by making sure that our children have books in their hands and in their homes touches the future in so many ways," Spence said.

In addition, this year the project expanded to the community, with remaining books divided and delivered to six locations across Pemberton Township. "Books will be at the Nesbitt and Johnson Centers, at central locations in Country Lakes, Presidential Lakes and Mirror Lake, and at a youth center on base," said Spence. "It's a great way to make books accessible to children who can walk or ride their bikes to borrow or exchange their books during the summer."

Earlier in the spring, preschool 3 & 4 students throughout

district were also the recipients of free books, thanks to The First Book Initiative. Through the program, new, high-quality books are donated by publishers to the nonprofit organization First Book, and then distributed to children in need, including low-income, military or disabled. The initiative strives to improve childhood literacy and educational achievement.

The books were distributed by Burlington County College, which last year became the first community college in the nation to incorporate this literacy initiative in its curriculum. More than 350 volunteers spent a week sorting, bundling and distributing the 40,000 books to 70 eligible organizations.

Coordinated by PECEC social worker Jamillah Parker, this

year team members from PECEC were invited to go to BCC on the day of distribution to receive their cartons of books. Once back at PECEC, children were allowed to pick out books to take home and keep, which is a proven way to get children to enjoy reading more.

"We're so happy to be part of this program," said Parker. "You can see the joy on the children's faces when they pick out their book and realize they can take it home."



After four long years, countless fundraisers, and detailed planning, eleven members of the PTHS Travel Club took off for Europe this spring—and were immediately bitten by the travel bug! Joined by advisors Mrs. Montero and Ms. Glassman, the students embarked on their first-ever trip outside the US, and were thrilled to report it was a smashing success.

First stop: London. Students learned the history of the country and visited such landmarks as Buckingham Palace, the London Eye, Westminster Abbey, Big Ben, the Tower of London, and Trafalgar Square. Then off to Paris, where they toured the Eiffel Tower, Notre Dame, the Louvre, and Galleries Lafayette and even cruised on the Seine River. The final European stop: Barcelona. Here, they enjoyed a bus tour overlooking the Mediterranean Sea, learned about the artist/architect Antoni Gaudí, explored the Park Güell, and went to an open air market that was home to some of the freshest fruits and vegetables they had ever seen.

And of course, no trip abroad is complete without sampling

# STUDENT SPANISH VIDEO TAKES 1ST PLACE IN STATE

Two fourth graders at Denbo/Crichton won 1st place in a state video contest sponsored by the Foreign Language Educators of New Jersey. Students from 20 schools around the state entered the contest, which required that the students speak in a foreign language for the entire video. Lucie Hoffman and Krish Maisuria, students in Mrs. Hammond's class and taught by Spanish teacher Mrs. Pecelli, were thrilled with the results.

# YOUNG AUTHOR INSPIRES BUSANSKY STUDENTS

Children get inspiration from a variety of sources, and for students at Busansky this spring, inspiration came in the form of a 13 year old author. When Kyle Dixon, III addressed the eager students at an assembly, they listened closely to what he had to say, even when he said he didn't always like school.

"I used to hate school," he said. "But the problem was *me*, not school. You need to look inside yourself to discover your greatness."

And Kyle should know about discovering greatness. After keeping a journal, he said he felt empowered, and came up with the idea for his book "Jay Bubblebee."

His book, which is available on Amazon.com, teaches

children they don't have to be perfect in order to achieve great things. It's the story of a bee named Jay who was born with bubbles instead of wings. His bubbles make it challenging for him to get a job like other worker bees. Inspired and determined not to give up, Jay decides to create his own path and becomes an entrepreneur by selling sneakers.

As Kyle spoke to the students, he shared funny anecdotes, but never strayed from delivering his message that everyone has a gift. "Ask yourself, 'What do I want to achieve NOW?' You don't have to wait until you're a grown-up to do it," he emphasized.

As part of his presentation, he gave every student a copy of his book and then signed it. His goal was to travel to 50 schools during the year, continuing to spread his message. "Everyone is my peer," he said. "I feel I'm doing something great and I want to continue to inspire them."
