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THE ARTS REEMERGE WITH LIVE PERFORMANCES IN 2021

From the annual PTHS musical to a plethora of winter concerts on the elementary and intermediate level, students throughout the district participated in a variety of live, in-person art and music based events for the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic emanated.

PTHS choral director and FAME Academy facilitator Christina Pinto collaborated with PTHS band director Raymond Quattrochi, PTHS alum Patrick Poole and Helen Fort colleagues Afton Pressley and Frank Zintel to create and perform a rendition of Charles Dickens' novella "A Christmas

Pemberton Players worked collectively to bring the musical to life. Art students in the FAME Academy helped design and construct the set, in addition to helping create costumes. Students from Amanda Taglairino's guitar and piano classes performed in the lobby for guests during intermission. And of course, students put their acting abilities to the test in a trio of performances in front of the public.

"We just thought, 'let's try something new and different,'" Pinto said. "Let's try to re-inspire our music program. (Patrick) and his wife wrote the adaption to "A Christmas Carol." We picked out the music that was geared towards our students. It gave us time to really figure out who our students are this year. We're all pulling together."

Sixth grade students at Newcomb, along with seventh and eighth graders at Helen Fort, collaborated to participate in the first band and choir concert of the winter season. The show kicked off with sixth grade band members from Newcomb performing a handful of holiday songs. Newcomb's choir students followed up the performance with their own series of sing-alongs before the seventh and eighth grade students took the stage to showcase their instrumental and vocal work to those in the audience. Pressley, Helen Fort's choral director, guided the choir students from both schools during their production while Zintel, Helen Fort's band director, enthusiastically directed

the band students with help from a few student volunteers from PTHS.

The reemergence of the arts continued as elementary students at Emmons, Denbo-Crichton and Stackhouse provided the district with three

FORT DIX STUDENTS GATHER TO COLLECT CANNED GOODS FROM 174TH INFANTRY BRIGADE

The 2-315 Brigade Engineer Battalion made an untraditional stop along its daily marching route at Fort Dix Elementary School on December 14. The unit, which is a part of the 174th Infantry Brigade at Fort Dix, arrived in a variety of outerwear from their daily uniforms, to Christmas gear and even flashy pajamas, to deliver canned goods and boxed food donations for students to collect and organize for this past holiday season.
